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Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. As Christmas Day is fast approaching and we are nearing the end of 2023, Mary and I want you to know that we are praying for you, dear reader. We pray that you and your family will have a good Holiday Season.

I want to share a message with you that I shared recently in our Sunday School Class. It was on Psalm 65. While I was studying and preparing for the lesson, I came across a talk on AI- Artificial Intelligence. The talk was given by a well-known atheist. He was presenting his case and asked the question, "Can we build AI without losing control over it?" He then added, "We have to admit that, if we keep going, we will develop some sort of super intelligence. We are in the process of building some sort of god. Now would be the time, a good time, to make sure it's a god we can live with."

That little phrase "a god we can live with" really got into my spirit. Man, in his fallen and rebellious state, can't accept and doesn't want to accept or believe in the true God, the Creator God. He wants to make his own god or even be his own god. We want a god of our own understanding or imagination. We want a god that we can live with, one that doesn't demand or require so much from us.

In Psalm 65, the psalmist presents to us the true God of creation, the living God. He gives us a good picture, a good description of God, a God that is very active in the earth, one whom we can't live without. Look with me at how the NKJV lays out this Psalm. 1) Praise is waiting You, O God, in Zion; and to You the vow shall be performed. 2) O You who hear prayer, to You all flesh will come. 3) Iniquities prevail against me; as for our transgressions, You will provide atonement for them. 4) Blessed is the man You choose, and cause to approach You, that he may dwell in Your courts. We will be satisfied with the goodness of Your house, of Your holy temple. 5) By awesome deeds in righteousness You will answer us, O God of our salvation, You who are the confidence of all the ends of the earth, and the far off seas; 6) who established the mountains by His strength, being clothed with power; 7) You who still the noise of the seas, the noise of their waves, and the tumult of the peoples. 8) They also who dwell in the farthest parts are afraid of Your signs; You make the outgoings of the morning and evening rejoice, 9) You

visit the Earth and water it, You greatly enrich it. The river of God is full of water. You provide their grain, for so you have prepared it.10)You water its ridges abundantly, You settle it's furrows, You make it soft with showers, You bless it's growth. 11)You crown the year with Your goodness, and Your paths drip with abundance. 12) They drop on the pastures of the wilderness, and the little hills rejoice on every side. 13) The pastures are clothed with flocks; the valleys are covered with grain. They shout for joy, they also sing.

Did you notice how many times YOU or YOUR was mentioned in these 13 verses? I believe it's 26 times. The psalmist referenced God 26 times in relation to His activity in our world and in our lives. YOU visit the earth. YOU water it. YOU greatly enrich it. YOU provide the grain. The atheist wants a god that he can live with. It would do us good to acknowledge this God that, honestly, we cannot live without. This really stirs my heart into Praise. If God was not actively visiting, watering, and providing, we could not exist. One puritan writer noted how easy it would be for God to starve us all. How true!

There are so many wonderful truths in this psalm, and I won't be able to exposit on all of them, but I want to highlight a couple things that really spoke to me. First, according to most scholars and teachers, this psalm was composed to be sung. As a matter of fact, the heading to Psalm 65 in the KJV reads – To the chief Musician, a Psalm and Song of David. The CSB version reads – For the choir director. A psalm of David. A song.

The nature of Psalm 65 points to one of the annual Jewish festivals when the community would come together for worship. Most likely this would have been the Feast of Tabernacles or Booths, also called the Festival of Shelters or the Festival of the Harvest. As they looked back over the past year and reflected on God's care of and provision for them, they would sing this Psalm, this Song. It has three stanzas. The first would be praising and worshipping God for His Grace (1-4). The second would include worshipping and praising God for His Greatness (5-8). The third would be thanking and praising God for His Goodness (9-13).

Notice the description the psalmist gives of God who rightfully deserves our praise; You, the *one who hears prayer*. O, aren't you glad that He hears our

prayers? That He bows His ear to our faintest cry, to our feeble attempts to communicate and call out and just talk to Him about everything that's on our hearts and that burdens us down so much. Thinking about the Creator of the world hearing and listening to my prayers really excites me.

Notice also in this first stanza that verse three speaks about "iniquities prevailing against him". Some translations use the phrase "being overwhelmed with our sins". Have you ever been overwhelmed by your sins? I know what it looks like and feels like to be overwhelmed by my sins. I know what it's like to be overwhelmed by the power of sin. I know what it's like to be overwhelmed by the shame and disgrace of my sin. I know what it's like to be overwhelmed with the consequences of my sin.

The psalmist then talks about how God will provide atonement for our sins. He certainly understood the sacrificial system of his day. An animal would have to die as his substitute, for his sins to be covered and forgiven. This is the season that we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. It was announced from the Angel that Mary would have a son and they would call his name Jesus and that He would save his people from their sins (Matthew 1:21). He would become our atonement, our substitute, as He gave His life on the cross for our sins. Have you ever been overwhelmed by the forgiveness we are offered and given?

Sometimes, I am so overwhelmed when I think about, recognize, and experience forgiveness. Recently, I was confronted with some people who had forgiven me for sins I had committed against them. They were wishing me well. One man, who I sit down to have dinner with one evening, showered me with love. Only through Jesus Christ. Yes, at times, I am so overwhelmed by forgiveness. Such mercy from God causes my heart to burst with gratitude to the God who forgives us so thoroughly. God's forgiveness is so great that He does more than just remove the bad. He invites and ushers us into His glorious presence as we can see in verse four.

In stanza number two, I'm just going to touch on verse seven, *You who still the noise of the seas, the noise of their waves...* According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, an average hurricane releases energy that is equivalent to 6 X 10 to the 14th power of that many watts of electricity. I'm not a math expert, but that sounds like a lot to me! They say an average hurricane produces more energy than all the electrical power plants on the planet are capable of producing. The National

Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) states, "In its lifetime, an average hurricane can release as much energy as ten thousand nuclear bombs." That's a lot of energy. And yet, this scripture says that God can and does still the noise of the seas and the raging of the waves. Do you remember the story in the New Testament when the disciples were in a boat out on the sea when a storm arose that was so strong these seasoned fishermen thought they were going to die? They didn't think they would make it through the storm. Do you remember what Jesus, who was on the boat with them did? He stood up and said to the wind and the waves, "Be still." Hallelujah!!

I don't know what kind of hurricane force waves or winds you may be experiencing in your life today, but our God, our Savior is Great and, in His Greatness, He has the power to calm the storms in your life. There's an old song that says, "Sometimes He calms the storm and sometimes He just calms me. Sometimes the storm still rages on, but I feel the sweetest peace." I pray He speaks that peace to each one of you today.

The third and final stanza of this Song speaks of God's Goodness to the people. As they reflected over the past year, they could see how God had provided for them throughout the year; how He had shown up and been actively at work in their behalf; how He had crowned the year with His goodness. Verse nine has a phrase that really blessed me. It states that the river of God is full of water. This speaks of an abundant supply of resources. There are several scriptures that mention the river of God. One of them is in Ezekiel 47. It talks about a river that flows out from under the throne of God. Everywhere it flows and everything it touches lives. Life springs up from this water. I know this chapter has some prophetic implications to it, but for spiritual application, it mentions ankle deep water, knee deep water, waist deep water, and waters to swim in. If this river of God has life in it and everything it touches lives, I don't want to just be sticking my foot in it. I want to jump in over my head and swim in it. Swim in the blessings of God. Swim in the life of God. Be thoroughly saturated with His life.

I mentioned earlier that Psalm 65 would be sung at the Feast of Tabernacles. I discovered something very interesting about the last day of this feast. The High Priest would take some water and pour it out on the altar as he prayed for next year's rain. It was at that very moment, in John 7:37-39, we find Jesus saying, *If any man is thirsty, let him come unto me*

and drink. He that believes on me out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water. Are you thirsty? Are you missing something in your life? Jesus was speaking about the Holy Spirit. He has all the resources of God that we need. This is the season we celebrate the birth of Jesus. He came to give us life. Ask Him today to give you this living water. He's a God, a Savior, you can't live without.

Thank God for His Grace, His Greatness and His Goodness.
